Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Gracious God, on that dark Friday Christ was crucified by a system of violence and oppression. Open our eyes to see that Christ is still being crucified in our world: in every school shooting, in every divisive act and gesture, and in our ambivalence to the ways we hurt one another and your creation. Teach us that thoughts and prayers only please you when they are met by action and change.

Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Gracious God, as Christ laid silently in the tomb for three days, bring our hearts to rest in you. Continue to teach us your ways, conform us to the cross of Jesus Christ, and bring us at last to the day of resurrection when we will learn once again that life is stronger than death, that love is stronger than hate, and that nothing in heaven or on earth will never be able to separate us from your amazing grace and love.

Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Hear us now as we pray to you in the name of Jesus Christ, as he taught us:

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. # Holy Week Begins

*Holy is the week...* 

Holy, consecrated, belonging to God... We move from hosannas to horror with predictable ease of those who know not what they do.

Our hosannas sung, our palms waved, let us go with passion into this week. It is time to curse fig trees that do not yield fruit. It is time to cleanse our temples of any blasphemy. It is time to greet Jesus as the Lord's Anointed One, to lavishly break our alabaster and pour perfume out for him without counting the cost.

It is a time for preparation...
The time to give thanks and break bread is upon us.
The time to give thanks and drink of the cup is imminent.
Eat, drink, remember:

On this night of nights, each one must ask, as we dip our bread in the wine, "Is it I?"

And on that darkest of days, each of us must stand beneath the tree and watch the dying if we are to be there when the stone is rolled away. The only road to Easter morning is through the unrelenting shadows of that Friday. Only then will the alleluias be sung; only then will the dancing begin.

#### **Postlude**

"Andante" from Piano Concerto No. 2 Dmitiry Shostakovich Shotakovich's second piano concerto is exuberant and joyful but also plaintive and subdued. The second movement, after a boisterous first movement, moves easily in and out of minor tonalities as if in a dream-like state. The piece reflects the range of emotions that accompany us through Holy Week, from joy and celebration to sorrow and pain. The movement ends on with an ominous repetition of a single note that ominously fades into silence.

"Christ Breaks The Rifle" is a provocative icon by celebrated artist Kelly Latimore. Latimore wrote this icon after the mass shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas, and has donated all proceeds from its sale to verified fundraisers addressing that great tragedy. The icon is not meant only to be provocative, but to reflect the biblical ideal of non-violence. The prophet Isaiah said, "He shall judge between the nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into plough-shares, and their spears into pruning-hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more" (2:4) and the Psalmist wrote, "He makes wars cease to the end of the earth; he breaks the bow, and shatters the spear; he burns the shields with fire" (46:9). May it be so.!
