

## \*Evening Prayer

Confession of Sin and Assurance of Pardon from Psalm 51 King David sinned against the Lord, committing adultery and murder. When he was confronted by the prophet Nathan, the king repented of his sins. In the Spirit-inspired words of a psalm, David expressed his sorrow over his sins and his trust in God's mercy and God, in his grace, forgave the repentant king. #### A Word About the Sanctuary Decorations from Pastor Andrew

Visuals are an important part of our faith. Wherever you look in the sanctuary you will see symbols that help us to live into the teachings of our faith. Whether it is the mosaic cross above the chancel or the baptismal font at center aisle, each conveys a message to accentuate our experience in worship. The same can be said of such architectural details of the church like the steeple, pointing us always to God above the fray of everyday life.

As I prayed about our observance of Lent, I wanted to represent both the starkness and richness of this season. The season is patterned off of Jesus' temptation in the wilderness, represented in our worship space by gnarly branches and jagged edges. This season is one of penitence and self-examination, represented by the deep tones of purple. Lent is a journey, from the mountain of Transfiguration to the cross, represented on the chancel by the sea of purple and willows, reminiscent of the Israel's journey to the Promised Land through the Red Sea. And at the center is the cross of Christ, high and lifted up for our adoration and praise. As we approach Holy Week and walk the steps of Jesus' death and resurrection, the cross will transform just as Jesus did during those three days in the tomb.

I thank the worship committee for allowing me to bring these ideas to life, and to Katie, Stacey, and many others who helped make it happen!
